

Hermon High School Winter Carnival



For a number of years, Hermon High School students have celebrated Winter Carnival the week before February school vacation. Graduating classes have written the history of their high school years citing the themes of the fall Spirit Week and of Winter Carnival and naming their classmates who served as Winter Carnival class royalty. They decorate for their class banquet with the banners class members created each year around the Winter Carnival theme. They laugh about relay races on sleds created from cardboard and duct tape. Winter Carnival traditionally includes an afternoon of activities that see a wide range of friendly competitions: hula hoop spinning, hacky sack kicking, ping pong, whiffle ball, board games, guessing games, digital games, and capture-the-flag or soccer on snow-covered fields.

Thanks to the Blizzard of 2017, memories of this year's Winter Carnival will be different. With two days house-bound, first watching snow fall and then cleaning paths to escape the house, and the threat of a third winter storm, activities this year were abridged. Nevertheless, students dressed up to reflect the "Music Makes the World Go Around Theme," showing off their Western Wednesday attire, their Throw Back Thursday tribute to the sixties, and a whopping 87% wearing school colors and Hermon Hawks clothing for Fight Song Friday. They participated in a school-wide assembly on Friday afternoon that heard the loudest class cheer (Sophomores), and witnessed the competitive spirit of all classes as they played Dodge Ball and Crab Soccer, and pulled for Tug-of-War championships. They celebrated school mates who participated in winter sports activities, including the 2017 Class B state champion Cheerleading squad, and cheered on boys' and girls' varsity basketball and indoor track teams as they prepared for tournament games and a state meet. The Seniors, class of 2017, were happy with their recognition as Winter Carnival 2017 winners.


<u>RECYCLING COMMITTEE-</u> The Town Council has made forming a recycling committee a goal for FY 2016-17. The Committee is tasked with looking at recycling options for the Town and to make recommendations to the Town Council to consider implementing. Currently we have 5 containers behind the Public Safety Building that residents can drop off eligible recycling material.

COLDBROOK AND NEWBURGH ROAD- The Town is requesting invitation to bid on paving projects for the Coldbrook and Newburgh Roads. These roads are in need of rehabilitation and repair. In a partnership with the Maine Department of Transportation the Town is responsible for 50% of the cost. MDOT is responsible for the remaining 50%. Here is a breakdown for each road:

Coldbrook Road Construction: Reconstruction activities will be over approximately 6,725 ft. of the Coldbrook Road as shown on the plan set. This project will consist of replacing and rebedding culverts, installing Type A gravel in driveways and shoulders as needed to provide a smooth transition from the 1.25" overlay. Mill to a depth of 1.25" from station 0+26 to station 10+50. The shim and overlay work will be performed by others. The contractor is responsible for prepping the road for paving and final grading. Contractor to coordinate final base grading and compaction work with Town's paving contractor. Once the final base grading is accepted by the Owner the paving contractor will pave the road. Contractor to return within seven (7) days of paving by Town's paving contractor to complete shoulder work.

Newburgh Road Construction: Reconstruction activities will be over approximately 12,025 ft. of the Newburgh Road as shown on the plan set. This project will consist of replacing and rebedding culverts, ditch improvements, installing level spreaders, 10" deep reclaim over the travel way and shoulders, grading desired cross slope and profile and installing Type A gravel in driveways and shoulders as needed to provide a smooth transition from new pavement. Four inches pavement over the travel way will be preformed by others. Construction activity in specified areas will consist of full road base reconstruction including the placement of a non-woven geotextile fabric. 18" of Type D gravel, 6" of Type A gravel and a total of 4" of hot mix asphalt as specified on the plans and details. Pavement work will be preformed by others. The contractor is responsible for prepping the road for paving and final grading. Contractor will coordinate final base grading and compaction work with Town's paving contractor. Once the final base grading is accepted by the Owner the paving contractor will pave the road. Contractor to leave a window of excess reclaim material and return within seven (7) days of paving by Town's paving contractor to complete shoulder work.



Bids will be accepted in March 2017 and project will be awarded in April. We hope to have these projects started this summer and completed this year. In the next addition of the Connection I will provide firm dates so you can adjust your driving habits.

The Senator's Corner

There is a lot of good energy in Augusta these days. The air is full with the promise of new ideas, initiatives, bills, and ways to move Maine forward. The first several months of any new legislature are a time of optimism.

Reality will set in soon enough – the reality that new visions cost money, that money means taxes, and that no one wants to pay more taxes. So we will soon be into the business of deciding which needs are vital and which are simply good ideas. Our list of needs is long: better funding for schools, health care, and the disabled; fewer potholes and safer roads and bridges; more revenue sharing for our towns and cities; the opioid crisis; and more, much more.

But our resources are finite. So we will spend the next four months balancing our dreams with fiscal reality. Our final budget will not please everyone but I think it will be good; we as legislators are working well together this session. I am optimistic that we can come up with a plan that is fair, funds current expenses, invests in our future, and leaves money in our pocketbooks.

I now know Augusta well enough so that I am on the Government Oversight Committee this session, that committee charged with ferreting out waste and malfeasance. It is important and interesting. I am also on the Environmental and Natural Resources Committee and the new Opioid Task force which is dealing with our tragic drug crisis. These along with my health care initiatives are keeping me busy.

Yes, spring has almost officially arrived. This means it's time to tweak our driving habits and our vehicles. Here are a few tips to help you enjoy spring driving in safety:

- 1. Don't be too eager to take off your winter tires. It is Maine and sometimes Mother Nature doesn't always cooperate no matter what time of year it is. We can still get some snowfall which means snowmelt and wet roads. Often these roadways tend to freeze during the night time hours when temperatures fall below freezing. If you notice these conditions, expect ice and SLOW DOWN.
- 2. As the weather warms it will bring out motorcyclists and cyclists. Please remember to practice good vision techniques and stay focused on spotting these smaller road users. Remember to share the road and ALWAYS LOOK TWICE.
- 3. Warmer weather brings more children outside. Slow down and pay extra attention in residential and school zones. Be alert for teenagers who tend to be fixated on their texting, socializing and cellphones and as a result, won't be paying much attention to traffic.
- 4. Keep your distance from the vehicle travelling in front of you. Dirt and rocks are more present on the roadway from winter sanding. This will prevent your windshield from being struck by a rock causing damage. It will also prevent you from having a rear end collision should another vehicle have to quickly brake or swerve to avoid unexpected potholes, frost heaves or debris in the roadway.
- 5. Heavy spring rains and snow melt can cause localized flooding on roadways. When encountering a flooded road please slow down. Never try to cross a flooded section of roadway under the water that could have been washed out. Turn around and seek an alternate route.
- 6. Warmer temperatures and snow melt mean soft gravel shoulders or washouts. Use extra care if you're pulling off the roadway or if you drop a wheel on the shoulder.
- 7. Many animals will be on the move due to winter hibernation and also looking for forage. These animals tend to move more frequently during the early morning, dusk and night time hours. Please slow down and be vigilant. Animals can often spook and be unpredictable when meeting a vehicle. They often dart out into traffic.
- 8. Also just a reminder that driver distraction is a leading cause of traffic accidents. It is important to stay focused and please stay off your cell phones. Remember text messaging while driving a motor vehicle <u>is against the law</u>!

BUSINESS PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION

THE ASSESSING OFFICE HAS MAILED THE ANNUAL BUSINESS PERSONAL PROPERTY DECLARATION FORMS (706 REQUESTS)

Maine Business Equipment Property Tax Relief Programs

The State of Maine has two business equipment property tax relief programs designed to reduce the burden of personal property taxes that businesses pay. The programs vary based on the date the property was placed in service in the state.

Business Equipment Tax Exemption Program (BETE)

For property placed in service after April 1, 2007, the Business Equipment Property Tax Exemption (BETE) program applies; commonly referred to as the "BETE" program. The exemption applies to most depreciable business equipment, however, certain items are excluded, such as, vehicles subject to excise tax, office furniture, lighting, gambling equipment, and property located at a retail sales facility and used primarily in a retail sales activity. Retail equipment will continue to be covered under Maine's Business Equipment Tax Reimbursement program, (BETR) as discussed further below.

A BETE application <u>MUST be filed ANNUALLY</u> with the tax assessor by April 1 of each year, but an extension to May 1 is automatically granted. Further extensions beyond May 1 may be requested in writing to the local assessor. Filing the BETE application on time is critical, as property will be disqualified from the exemption for any year the report is not considered to be timely filed. The exemption application <u>MUST LIST ON THE APPLICATION</u> all eligible exempt property purchased after April 1, 2007 *each year*, not only in the year of purchase. There is no time limit on the number of years the exemption may be claimed, but the business or business owner must apply annually with a completed application and itemized list of personal property requesting exemption on.


Business Equipment Tax Reimbursement Program (BETR)

The BETE program described above is in addition to the Business Equipment Tax Reimbursement referred to as (BETR) program. This program applies to eligible equipment first placed in service in Maine after April 1, 1995 and on or before April 1, 2007. Certain retail equipment excluded from the BETE program continues to be eligible for the BETR program (retailers should consult Maine Revenue's Guidance Document mentioned above).

The BETR eligible personal property definition is essentially the same as for BETE, and can be claimed at 100% of the assessed amount for 12 years. Beyond 12 years the reimbursement rate is reduced to 75% or less of the assessed tax.

There is a two-part process for receiving reimbursement under the BETR program. First, Form 801A (for the first 12 years) or 801B (for subsequent years), Assessor Notification, must be filed with the local assessor. The assessor has 60 days to complete the form. Second, Form 800, Business Equipment Tax Reimbursement Application, is filed by the taxpayer with the State along with the completed Form 801. The State releases these forms August 1st of each year. The reimbursement program is for taxes paid in the prior year, which means payments made in 2016 will be reimbursable between Aug. 1st through December 31st, 2017. Form 800 must be filed with the state by December 31, 2017.

Pre-K Registration At Hermon Elementary School

Hermon Pre-K Registration will begin on **March 15th**, for Hermon children entering Pre-K in the fall.

Children must be 4 years old by October 15th, 2017, to be eligible for Pre-K.

Parents are invited to come into HES on **March 15th from 5:00-6:30** to fill out Pre-K registrations. Following the March 15th registration session you may obtain registration packets between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. at the Hermon Elementary School office.

Students will be placed on the enrollment list and waiting list in a first come first serve fashion. We will fill 40 slots (20 am and 20 pm) and hold 4 slots (2 am and 2 pm) for extenuating circumstances (needs based), until August 21st, at which time any remaining slots will go to the students next on the waiting list.

What you will need for the registration to be complete and your child to be placed on the list:

- Completed registration packet
- Proof of residency (example: tax bill, lease, utility bill, etc.)
- Child's state issued (not hospital-issued) birth certificate
- Current immunization record.

Pre-K open house will take place in May and will be scheduled at a later date.



Kindergarten Registration At Hermon Elementary School

Kindergarten Registration will begin on March 6th, for Hermon children entering school in the fall.

Children must be 5 years old by October 15th, 2017, to be eligible for Kindergarten.

Parents may obtain registration packets between 9:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. at the Hermon Elementary School office, beginning MONDAY, MARCH 6th.

Completed packets should be returned to the school by Thursday March 30th.

You will need to provide:

- child's state issued (not hospital-issued) birth certificate
- current immunization record
- proof of residency (examples: tax bill, utilities bill, lease, etc.)

Kindergarten screening will take place and be scheduled at a later date.
