#### From the Town Manager

<u>WINTER IS COMING</u>: Winter weather is unpredictable and at times dangerous. Driving this time of year requires extra caution and attention. Be safe and enjoy the season. Gardner Construction is responsible for plowing most of the municipal roads and streets from Fuller Road to I-95. The only exception is Billings Road and Newburgh Road. The Fuller Road intersection toward Union Street and all of the side streets and roads off of Union Street are maintained by The Town of Hermon Public Works. If you have questions regarding plowing please call Ralph Shaw, Public Works Foreman @ 570-6494.

Mailboxes are the responsibility of the property owner and they must be installed within USPS standards. The Town assumes no liability for mailboxes damaged during winter plowing operations.

<u>TAX BILLS</u> – The Town has once again kept the current mil-rate @ 11.99 per thousand dollars of property taxes. For every dollar raised .80 cents goes to the school department, .10 cents goes to Penobscot County, and the other .10 cents goes to municipal operations such as fire, law enforcement services, public works, code enforcement, etc. I would like to thank Michael Chammings, Finance Director and Josh Berry, Assessor for putting together this year's tax commitment. It was great to see the teamwork required for this important part of our operation.

**ELECTION** - Town Clerk Kristen Cushman and her staff have done an excellent job on the presidential election. This election, at the time of this writing, has been historic in voter turnout and requests for absentee ballots. I would like to thank all who participated in this event.

**NEWBURGH ROAD AND BILLINGS ROAD** - for those of you that live or travel on either of these roads you have noticed a fair amount of construction taking place. Next summer we plan on coming back and finishing the remaining sections. #### **Time to Prepare For Winter Weather**

Autumn leaves are falling everywhere. When you put away the rake, be sure to start thinking about prepping your vehicle for winter driving before the weather hits us. The following are some steps people can take to prepare themselves for the upcoming winter season:

- 1. Check or change your vehicle's tires. Check your tire pressure. Make sure your vehicle is not equipped with summer tires or tires that are low in tread. If you are driving on freezing roads, ice or snow covered roadways you will not be able to maneuver your vehicle safely for the road conditions.
- 2. Check your vehicle's antifreeze. Make sure the level is appropriate and it is conducive to sub-zero freezing temperatures.
- 3. Check your vehicle's windshield wipers and washer fluid. Make sure you have adequate winter wiper blades and suggested de-Icer washer fluid to prevent ice from freezing on your windshield. Make sure your windows and windshield are always clear of ice and snow.
- 4. Check your vehicle's battery to make sure it is fully charged and able to start in sub-zero temperatures. Your vehicle will not run without an adequate battery and being stranded in freezing temperatures is not fun.
- 5. Watch for animals while driving (especially at night). Deer and Moose are mostly nocturnal animals this time of year and are often visible during the evening and night time hours while they search for food. Make sure both of your headlights are working correctly. It is not uncommon for headlamps to "burn-out" when the temperatures start to drop below normal.
- 6. Think ahead and pack some items to keep in your vehicle that you may be able to use during an emergency situation. Items such as a cell phone charger, water, food or snacks, bag of salt or sand, shovel, reflective clothing, blankets, jumper cables, tow strap, first-aid kit, flashlight with extra batteries, extra coat, gloves or winter hat.
- 7. Most of all, SLOW DOWN. Make sure you drive using a "safe speed" conducive to the weather conditions. If the weather conditions mean you have to drive slower than the posted speed limit, then so be it! Plan ahead and give yourself time to travel safely. Your life and the life of your passengers are the most important factor of all! DRIVE SAFE AND RESPONSIBLY!

**REMINDER:** MDOT road construction is scheduled to start this fall at the four-way intersection of Route 2, Klatte Rd and Annis Rd. Commuter traffic on Route 2 is very heavy in the mornings and early evenings. Please be patient with traffic issues as the construction, heavy commuter traffic and school traffic will be busy during these times. Please keep in mind that traffic may be delayed (especially in the mornings) and you may have to adjust your schedule to arrive at your destination in a timely manner.

Food Pantry moves to new location at Danforth's Plaza...





The USDA estimates that more than 11 million children in the United States lived in food insecure households in 2018. Food insecurity is defined as limited or uncertain access to food. Food insecurity is a household-level economic and social condition of limited access to adequate food. It is distinct from hunger, an individual-level physiological condition that may result from food insecurity.

Since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, food insecurity has increased. By the end of April 2020, **more than one in five households** in the United States, and two in five households with mothers with children 12 and under, were food insecure.

With 30 million children in the U.S. dependent on school for one or more of their meals each week, extended school closures and loss of family income mean food insecurity rates will continue to rise. Fortunately for students living in our sending districts, the schools have worked hard during the pandemic to alleviate this issue by delivering lunches to homes during this period of uncertainty.

Local food pantry efforts like *Neighbors Supporting Neighbors* make a real difference to those in need. After establishing nonprofit status in May of 2008, a dedicated group of volunteers began serving perishable and non-perishable food products, pet supplies and clothing at a Northern Maine Junction location. From there, they operated at Hermon Snowmobile Club until landing in a new location at Danforth's Plaza. A grand opening is scheduled for November 5, 2020. With help from *Ellis Property Management* at the Plaza, *Neighbors Supporting Neighbors* will continue to serve the residents of Hermon, Carmel, Levant, Etna, Dixmont and Hampden.

Programs currently include Thanksgiving boxes with the traditional fare along with a Christmas effort for children under 18 and Seniors over the age of 65.

"Moving from the smaller space at Danforth's Plaza where we lived for 5 years to the new larger space in the same mall will allow us an opportunity to provide clothing and pet supplies in addition to our regular food effort...it's an exciting time for our program! says Carol Lackedy. Carol has organized the effort with base volunteers and community support since the pantry's start.

There is something about the winter months and curling up with a good book by the fireplace. But did you know that heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

#### BE WARM AND SAFE THIS WINTER!

- Keep anything that can burn at least three-feet (one metre) away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot (one metre) "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month.

## Heating Equipment Smarts

Install wood burning stoves following manufacturer's instructions or have a professional do the installation. All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.

Install and maintain CO alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning. If you smell gas in your gas heater, do not light the appliance. Leave the home immediately and call your local fire department or gas company.

## **Get Ready for Winter!**

When we turn our attention to fall and the associated duties ahead, winter isn't far behind! That means maintaining the roads so that our residents can be safe as they travel. A few tips and reminders for all of us to be aware of concerning snow removal and right of way issues, along with some safety suggestions are listed below:

- Never plow snow into the road or right of way the snow that falls on your property needs to be placed or stored on your property.
- Park cars and vehicles off the street before and also during any storm even with small amounts of snow, our trucks work to clear the roads for safety. Please help by keeping your vehicles on your own property during each snow event.
- If you have a question about plowing, contact the Town office at 848-1010. NEVER stop a plow driver during his route to discuss plowing issues on the road during a storm.

Another hardship brought by winter storms to our residents is when their mailboxes are damaged inadvertently during snow removal. Some mailboxes seem to live for years without being touched, while others are hit more often. There are a lot of factors that go into the reasons why some mailboxes have a better survival rate, but one of those is design. Suggested mailbox designs that are more likely to survive frozen banks being pushed back, a small nudge during low visibility and direct hits when the plows are crowded to the roadside by oncoming traffic can be found at: https://www.maine.gov/mdot/winterdriving/mailboxpolicy/

Remember that anything placed in the right of way, is placed at your own risk. This includes mailboxes that are not considered "break away" support posts. Never place anything in the right of way that is categorized as a "deadly fixed object" as described in the MDOT M.R.S.A 1401-A mailbox policy.

The Town of Hermon and its snow plow contractor work hard to provide safe roadways in the cold winter months. Give us a call if you have questions or suggestions to improve service.
