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V. NEWS, PRESENTATIONS AND RECOGNITIONS:

Town Manager Howard Kroll: Welcomed Sergeant Gary Decker as the new Sergeant for <u>Hermon.</u>

- VI. PUBLIC ITEMS OR COMMENTS: (Items Not Already on Agenda)
 - Donald Page 720 Newburgh Rd: Hermon is a great town to live in. Mr. Page thanked the staff, council and school board for their hard work and service as they are tough jobs.
 - <u>Shawn McBreairty from Hampden Maine: I understand you as Hermon town council</u> <u>members have influence but no real authority over the Hermon School District.</u> <u>Except that little item of having to approve or hopefully disapprove of the budget.</u> <u>Hermon School District has a lawsuit against Shawn McBreairty. I submit to you</u> <u>Mr. Chair, this lawsuit against me, Sean McBrearty, from the school department.</u> <u>And I would like to submit into the minutes.</u>
 - <u>Nicole LaBarnes 6th grade math teacher at Hermon Middle School: We just saw the</u> <u>shooting in Texas....We care about the kids and would protect them as if they were</u> <u>our own.</u>
 - Mallory Cook Hermon High School teacher and Gender and Sexuality Alliance Advisor: This is a club for students created by students to create a safe space.
 - Ernest Wheeler 20 Billings Rd: Requested water test results.

Howard Kroll: 20 Billings Road water test was negative for E. coli. LPI (Licensed Plumbing Inspector) will review.

Reverend Carl Schreiber Jr 2009 Skyway Valley: I have had four children who have come through the Hermon school system and are now a nurse practitioner, a teacher, department head at St. Joseph Hospital and Covenant Health IT security. All have done well through the Hermon school system. When you give back to the students, it will pay back in this community tenfold.

VII. PUBLIC HEARINGS:

• Hold Public Hearing – Municipal Budget for FY 2022-2023

<u>Chair Thomas opened the public hearing at 7:23PM.</u> Public comments were given. The hearing closed at 7:31PM

Manager Kroll gave an overview of the Municipal Budget.

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- Amy Oliver Stubbs 640 York Rd: Resident for over 40 years. If putting a moratorium on new subdivisions and new apartment complexes is on the table because we can't sustain our services and the growth we have right now.
- Chair Thomas: There has been a lot of discussion about some type of moratorium
because there is concerned about the residential growth. Every house if they
have one or two students, it does add a lot to the burden of the schools.
Having said that, if you look at the numbers for the high school, right now we
have 267 tuition students. That's 48% of the student population. These are
kids that are coming from Carmel, Levant, and Glenburn. Even if there was
a moratorium, it doesn't prevent developers from building in Carmel and
Levant. If the houses are built in those communities, they don't have a high
school. They come here and they pay less. If they live in Carmel, and come
here, the tuition that we receive is less per student than if they lived here on
Hermon. We are experiencing growth, but a moratorium based on these
numbers probably will not fix the issue.

Amy Oliver-Stubbs: Can something be done with the tuition rates?

<u>Chair Thomas: That's something that the school committee or the superintendent</u> <u>would have to address.</u>

• Hold Public Hearing -- School Budget for FY 2022-2023

<u>Chair Thomas opened the public hearing at 7:31PM.</u> Public comments were given. The hearing closed at 8:47PM

Superintendent Micah Grant gave an overview of the school budget.

<u>Chair Thomas: At the last council meeting we talked about the surplus. After the deposits tomorrow, the school will have over \$3.5 million and the operating account. If this was the last day of the month, and those funds were in there that would be a surplus. And what's happened over the past several years is that surplus has grown every year. At the end of last year, that was \$2.8 million on undesignated surplus. And if this \$3.5 million figure holds, I know you're going have some expenditures over the next month, but you're going get almost another million dollars.</u>

<u>Micah Grant: We've overspent our revenues by just under a million dollars, we</u> <u>will not be taking any money into undesignated funds, we will spend to zero.</u> <u>We still have six payrolls to go, that's almost a million and a half dollars. We</u> <u>still have a variety of other expenses that have to be rounded out, we will not</u> <u>be adding money to the undesignated fund.</u>

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<u>Chair Thomas: So even in the worst-case scenario, you're still going to have close</u> <u>to \$2.8 million from the surplus fund. This is a significant amount of money.</u> <u>A law in the State of Maine states schools is not supposed to carry a surplus</u> <u>of over 9%. And what's in the checking account right now is 22% of last</u> <u>year's budget, that's more than twice the legal limit. You're asking us to</u> <u>increase taxes when the money is in the bank to cover operating</u> <u>requirements.</u>

Micah Grant: Yes, that's correct. Because these expenses are operational costs.

- Brian Walsh 48 Hardwood Dr: I was the principal if Hermon High school before we had to put a buzzer on the door and lock the place up and add 38 security cameras. During my tenure, I have four times including this year, asked for an SRO that's a school resource officer. And I realize money is tight. I did ask for that back in the fall when we started the budget process. And I'm not going to ask the Council for \$110,000 for an SRO. However, I would just ask you to take that into consideration if indeed we really do have 4.1 million. and another 2.7 million. It looks like the town with \$6.8 million is healthy. I think we've been conservative and smart, fiscally responsible for many years. And I just want to bring that up when it comes to student safety. And I just want to say that we've had this conversation multiple times over the years when a tragedy has occurred. We've had the conversation when a tragedy has not occurred. Some of you may or may not remember, I held a safety summit with the FBI, federal agents, US Marshals, TSA, John Snyer, we had 22 agencies at the high school. We had a real serious conversation about school safety. We had Glenn Barnes from the FBI, some of you may remember when he was at Columbine. He lived in town; his kids went through this through the system. And one of the interesting things that came out of that they said, they'd never sat down together and had that conversation. And the bottom line was we think school resources officers a great idea, but there's expense to it. I'm not asking you for anything other than conversation to continue.
- Danielle Haggerty 10 Bog Rd: And I got the opportunity to go over the budget extensively. Budgets aren't foreign to me, it's something I do on my everyday life. And I feel like the committee and Micah did a great job looking at expenditures. They seem to be hitting the IT concerns head on with both federal funds and making use outside funds. The much-needed raises, as you guys all said, everything's going up for everybody. And then the added staff at the high school, which the numbers show is necessary. We as a town are in the most amazing position. Towns all over the United States would like to be in our position. We have reserved funds that are adequately funded and we're making use of in this budget. We have funds in our checking account

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that aren't designated. We have 2.8 million. The city also has undesignated fund balance, which I believe you're required to carry. Am I right?

- Howard Kroll: We have a fund balance policy in town that we can go up to 25% of all combined budgets, school, and municipal County. It would be around \$6 million. That would be the cap that we could combine for undesignated fund balance?
- Danielle Haggerty: And what do you do with it? Because it sounds like a lot of money, like the books going to close, and you're going to have \$4 million. What are you going to do with the \$4 million?
- Howard Kroll: We send out our tax bills, late August 1 first of September. They are not due until April. The majority pay taxes at the end of March and first of April. We go about nine months with no cash flow other than excise tax. So that \$4.2 million, every month I pay the school about \$471,000 a month, the end of September, pay the county commitment, which was \$960,000. And by the time we start collecting the money, we're down to about \$1.8 million in the checking account. I can spend all that money and we go borrow July 1 and have a tax anticipation note. However, I think the philosophy of this town is that's not the way we're going to live. And that's not the way we are going operate. I know this council is very prideful on the mill rate, but also, how do we protect the town from the unforeseen. Two years ago, March when pandemic hits we were down about \$400,000 in excise tax. And the only thing that really saved us was the timing and we were getting, about 90% of our property taxes paid the end of March 1 and April. We had an influx of money, but I couldn't spend it. We had a freeze on our municipal budget, based on the unforeseen. And you know what we got lucky, we opened back up the town office in mid-May. And we came within \$10,000 of what we projected for that FY. We got lucky, but it was all based-on time. That money is there to keep operations afloat for about three quarters of the year.
- Danielle Haggerty: It's not uncommon for towns to collect taxes twice a year, <u>correct?</u>
- Howard Kroll: I've worked in four or five other municipalities, and we cut your bill in half and we bill you in late summer and in the spring. This is for cash flow purposes only.

Danielle Haggerty: I believe that part of the problem that has been created by two major things one is the tuition we are not capturing the maximum number of tuition dollars could. And not to blame anybody or anything federal funds were coming. We were in a pandemic, everybody's doing the best they can. And then we're on the other end and realize, Oh, no. And then I think the

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other part that we talked about was there was a huge drop in census students in 2020. Do you want to explain how that impacts what you are getting paid?

- Micah Grant: Yes, they wanted the EPSE279. They took a two-year average and so they take the fall average of 2020 and the fall average of 2021. In October our census calculation fall average is 1270. And then this year was 1390. We're getting hit for less kids. They're paying us for 1319 kids, but we have more like 1350. And next year, we're going to have 1378. We're going to get a little bit higher but that fall count really hurt us in respect to our average number of kids, which is money directly from the state.
- Danielle Haggerty: Further talks that next year, when the census calculation is done based on the fall, it would be a 50 student's gap. The gap will start to close.

Micah Grant: Yes, the gap will start to close.

Danielle Haggerty: And does that equate to revenues coming in?

Micah Grant. Yes.

Danielle Haggerty: At the same time, if say we were to add maybe 300, more from your undesignated funds, the tuition going up through the great things you're doing with staffing at the high school, and the state calculation going up? It doesn't really create as huge of a difference in two to three years, then it may seem.

Micah Grant: Hopefully not.

Danielle Haggerty: I really encourage you guys to consider using the Undesignated funds a little more this year, if you have any say in that tonight at all, just to maybe use them more this year, and a little less and a little less. While Micah is doing the good work to close the gap. And the state calculation is going to work to our favor. It may work out that we could get away with not as big of a gap as it may have seemed on paper.
