

2023 dog tags are available as of October 15, 2022.

Residents who need vet care or rabies for their animals should make their appointments NOW for 2023 licensing. Information has been communicated by the State Vet Association that they are experiencing a vet shortage / lack of remote clinics and resources.

Please license your dog before January 31. The State of Maine demands a \$25.00 late fee for any dog renewal license after 1/31/2023. Go to http://bit.ly/3UWzln4 to license a previously registered dog or a new dog online.

Legislative Update

2022 Legislative Session Update With Rep. Jim Thorne House District 35 - Carmel and Hermon

High energy costs will need to be addressed when the Legislature reconvenes

On December 7, 2022 members of the 131st Legislature raised their right hand and swore an oath to uphold the Constitution. I again thank those who placed their trust in me over the next two years. I will do my best to represent everyone, regardless of political party or persuasion.

The first legislative day is usually confined to ceremonial duties, organization of the House, and the election of Maine's constitutional officers (Attorney General, Treasurer, Auditor, and Secretary of State). Legislation is usually not considered on day one.

That was not the case this year. The Governor submitted emergency energy legislation for consideration. It passed the House overwhelmingly (125-16), but failed in the Senate. I am hopeful that, by the time you read this, energy relief has been approved that will assist our friends and neighbors that are struggling to heat their homes and pay bills.

In addition to short term relief, we also need to take a hard look at state energy policies that are contributing to high electric, oil, and gas prices. Everyone needs a seat at the table and a willingness to consider all options, not just the ones favored by lobbyists. I look forward to seeing significant legislation that can be acted upon to bring down prices in the long-term.



A culture that favors work and job creators will lower taxes for everyone and provide appropriate safety nets without over-burdening taxpayers or retirees.
