New Life to A Little Library

The Little Library located outside of Hermon Middle School was a Sliver award project done by Girl Scouts Lily Raleigh and Laura Taylor of Troop 1340 in 2020. The Sliver Award is the highest award a Girl Scout Cadet can earn. Their Little Library was built from scratch, using mostly recycled wood. It took a few hits from storms over the next few years, and the door had to be replaced.

In 2023 the girls where Heartbroken to find out that the library was actually vandalized. The door was completely ripped off, parts missing and books destroyed. Some Hermon residents stepped up to help repair it but it still had to be strapped shut.

Last year the Troop was contacted by a Scouting America parent, their Son Alex Rancourt, a scout with SA Troop 24 and HMS Student, was interested in restoring the library. Over the past winter Alex team up with Lily and a couple adults to revitalize the library in the basement of the Mason Hall. The group not only fixed the library but also gave it a fresh new coat of paint. On May 27 it was placed back in the ground with a more stable base. The library now stands proudly once again, a showcase of community, teamwork and resilience.

Hermon Hawk Battalion Commander Accepted into Four Star Leadership Program

To be considered for admission into General Tommy Franks' Four Star Leadership Program, you need to demonstrate strong leadership qualities, specifically in communication, integrity, accountability, creativity, and decision making. It is clear Aubrey excels in all of these areas. Aubrey Searway, The Hermon Hawk Battalion Commander, was accepted into the Four Star Leadership program for this summer. This year, The Four Star Leadership program accepted 76 students from across the country to join them in Oklahoma during the week of July 13-18.

The Four Star Leadership program was created in 2008 and has accepted over 1,100 sophomores and juniors since then. To add into this amazing opportunity, the entire program is fully paid for and can earn the recipient over 40,000 dollars in scholarships if they are eligible. General Tommy Franks, the founder of the program and former general with 36 years of service and multiple medals, aims to create the same opportunities for everyone, no matter their economic status. This program not only teaches their students about communication and developing core leadership values, but also teaches about ethical decision-making abilities. Aubrey intends to take full advantage of this learning opportunity to better the battalion and take her leadership skills with her throughout her adult life after high school.

The submission and interview process of this program was shared to us by Aubrey herself. Aubrey found out about the program very late in the timeframe to submit an application. Fortunately, she only had to wait about a week for the interview process to take place. One of the things that made Aubrey stand out from the other applicants was her involvement. Aubrey happens to be one of two students chosen to represent the school during school board meetings, she was one of 40 students for the Northern Light volunteer program, she served as class of 26's class historian, she's very involved in student council, has over 600 hours of community service, and as of May 14, 2025 is the Hermon Hawks JROTC Battalion Commander. "I was able to highlight my community involvement, dedication to service, and ability to lead based on the clubs and events I submitted in my application." Aubrey stated in an interview about this program.

We wish her well on her new experiences during this leadership conference to help take our JROTC program to the next level.

Legislative Update 2025 Legislative Session Update with Rep. Jim Thorne House District 35 - Carmel and Hermon

One-Party Rule Leaves Out Maine Families

Dear Friends,

For the third time in a row, Maine's state budget has been passed without any input from Republican legislators. Democrats, holding complete control in Augusta, once again chose to bypass the traditional bipartisan budget process. This so-called "Majority Budget" adds hundreds of millions in new spending to the already record-high \$11.3 billion plan passed earlier this year-bringing the total to over \$11.6 billion.

When Republicans last had a seat at the table, the state budget stood at just over \$8 billion. That's a dramatic increase in government spending in just a few short years.

What's most disappointing is that despite all this new spending, the budget does little-if anything-to help reduce the cost of living for Maine families or provide meaningful tax relief. Instead, it introduces and expands a series of new taxes and fees that will hit working people, retirees, and small businesses the hardest.

Key Tax Hikes in the New Budget:

- Cigarette Tax Increase: A \$1.50 per-pack hike, raising \$110 million over two years. This tax hits low-income Mainers especially hard.
- Digital Streaming Tax: A new 5.5% tax on services like Netflix, Hulu, and Spotify.
- Cannabis Tax Increase: Recreational marijuana taxes will rise from 10% to 14%.
- Pension Deduction Limits: Reduced deductions on private pensions, putting more pressure on seniors with fixed incomes.
- New Paint Fee: A 50-cent charge per gallon of paint will increase costs for homeowners, contractors, and DIYers.
- Outdoor License Fee Hikes: Increased costs for hunting and fishing licenses.
- Real Estate Transfer Tax: A steep increase in the tax on property sales over \$1 million, adding pressure to Maine's already strained housing market.

No Reforms to Growing Welfare Costs

Beyond the tax increases, the budget fails to address the unsustainable growth of welfare spending-particularly within the General Assistance (GA) program. Another \$4 million will be allocated over the next two years with no reforms, oversight, or accountability.

From 2019 to 2024, Portland alone received more than 80% of all GA funding statewide, totaling over \$123 million. Meanwhile, smaller towns are left with fewer resources to support their own residents.

ICE Cooperation Blocked

Adding to the concern, Democrats passed legislation that prevents Maine law enforcement from cooperating with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), even when violent criminals are involved. This comes at a time when border-related arrests in Maine have reached a 24-year high-113 individuals from 16 countries were arrested here in April alone.

It is reckless to block cooperation with federal immigration officials in the face of these numbers. Public safety should not be a partisan issue.

A Missed Opportunity

Not a single Republican in the House or Senate supported this budget-not because we're against solving problems, but because we offered real solutions that would have avoided tax hikes and introduced responsible reforms. Unfortunately, those ideas were ignored.

This budget expands government, increases taxes, and avoids the tough decisions needed to ensure long-term stability. Mainers deserve better-a budget that respects taxpayers, protects the vulnerable, and supports a strong, sustainable future.



About Pine Tree Camp:






